#### THE CONTRIBUTORS

NORMAN J. PADELFORD, Professor of Political Science and a member of the senior staff of the Center for International Studies at M.I.T., is also chairman of the board of editors of *International Organization*. During the past year he has been studying the problem of United Nations financing for the Brookings Institution and recently received a Faculty Research Fellowship from the Social Science Research Council for further work in this field.

ROBERT E. WARD is Professor of Political Science and a member of the Center for Japanese Studies at the University of Michigan. Among his recent books are *Modern Political Systems: Asia* (1963) and *Modern Political Systems: Europe* (1963), of which he and Roy C. Macridis are co-editors, and a forthcoming volume, *Political Modernization in Japan and Turkey*, edited with D. A. Rustow.

H. L. NIEBURG will become Associate Professor of Political Science at the University of Wisconsin in the fall. During the past two years he has been an Assistant Professor at Case Institute of Technology, conducting graduate studies in science and public policy. His book, *Nuclear Secrecy: A Study in Strategic Schizophrenia*, is to appear later this year.

CHARLES WOLF, JR., a Senior Economist on the staff of The RAND Corporation, is the author of Foreign Aid: Theory and Practice in Southern Asia (1960) and co-author, with S. C. Sufrin, of Capital Formation and Foreign Investment in Underdeveloped Areas (1958).

ANDREW C. JANOS has been a Research Associate of the Center of International Studies at Princeton University, working in the fields of political violence and Eastern European politics. He is joining the faculty of the Department of Political Science at the University of California in Berkeley in the fall of 1963.

STEVEN MULLER is Director of the Cornell University Center for International Studies and Associate Professor of Government. He served as a member of the Woods Hole Summer Study on Verification and Response, administered by the Institute for Defense Analyses in 1962 for the United States Arms Control and Disarmament Agency, and is currently working on problems of arms control.

HAROLD SPROUT is Henry G. Bryant Professor of Geography and International Relations, and Faculty Associate of the Center of International Studies, at Princeton University. Co-author (with Margaret Sprout) of *Foundations of International Politics* (1962), he is engaged in a study (again in collaboration with Margaret Sprout) of Britain's changing role in international politics.

CHARLES BURTON MARSHALL is associated with the Washington Center of Foreign Policy Research and is a contributing editor of *The New Republic*. He is teaching at the 1963 summer session at Harvard.

MICHAEL HOWARD is Reader in War Studies at the University of London and author of, among other works, *The Franco-Prussian War* (1961). He is presently working on *Grand Strategy*, Vol. IV (August 1942-September 1943), for the United Kingdom Military Histories of the Second World War.
