THE WHITE HOUSE WASHINGTON

Dear Dr. Stanford:

Each of them personifies high service to their country and strong leadership in promoting more binding ties of friendship among the American Republics.

Each has been inspired by vigorous humanitarian sentiments, and each has demonstrated vividly a love of liberty and a will to achieve a universe where men can dwell together in harmony.

Their dedication to the cause of human freedom and world peace has been an influential force in the life of Rafael Belaunde's son, Fernando Belaunde Terry, who as President of Peru stands today in the forefront of those striving to realize the ideals and purposes of the Alliance for Progress.

I share your thought that it is particularly fitting for the University of Miami to honor Victor Andres and Rafael Belaunde.

Your Latin American Department, of which they were the founding professors, has developed over the decades into a distinguished center of Latin American studies.

It is an appropriate testimony to the firm foundations with which they endowed the early vision of a great inter-American university.

In these days when understanding and good will among all peoples are so sorely needed, we must look to greater and more effective international education as one of our main hopes.

Victor Andres and Rafael Belaunde realized and acted upon this truth more than a generation ago. We do right to acknowledge their foresight and wisdom.
