Wednesday, 27th July, 10 A.M.—"Otitis Media of Sucklings." Opened by Mr. W. M. Mollison. 12 noon.—Dr. Kerr Love—"How Miss Helen Keller was Educated." (Miss Keller and her teacher, Mrs. Macey, will give a short demonstration.)

Thursday, 28th July, 10 A.M.—"Intra-thoracic New Growths and the Value of Bronchoscopy in Diagnosis and Treatment." Opened by Dr. Maurice Davidson. A paper on "The Radiographic Demonstration of Sinusitis" will be read by Dr. Graham Hodgson.

Friday, 29th July, 10 A.M.—"End Results of the Tonsil and Adenoid Operation in Childhood and Adolescence." Opened by Dr. Alison Glover. A paper on "Diseases of the Tonsils due to Fungi" will be read by Sir Aldo Castellani. At 3 P.M. a visit will be paid to the Mount Vernon Hospital, Northwood. A short introductory address will be given by Sir Cuthbert Wallace, K.C.M.G., C.B., F.R.C.S., on the work being carried out at the hospital, followed by a demonstration of cancer patients treated by radiotherapy.


SOCIÉTÉ FRANÇAISE DE PHONIATRIE.
